Executive Board Nominations







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The Science of Being Human



A scholarship honoring the memory of beloved MD Anderson UTHealth Graduate School professor and deceased UTHRO member Henry Strobel.

Students, colleagues, and friends of the late Henry W. Strobel, PhD, still envision him three-stepping through the labs of MD Anderson UTHealth Graduate School in his

clerical collar, toes tapping as he skips toward another meeting. In the years since his passing in 2019, his delightful footsteps and guiding words still echo.

“Dr. Strobel didn’t just teach us how to be scientists,” says Auinash “Nash” Kalsotra, PhD ’05. “He taught us how to be human beings.”

To former Strobel mentees (who refer to themselves as Strobelians) Strobel was more than a teacher—he was a role model, parental figure, and trusted confidant. In addition to his faculty appointments at the graduate school and McGovern Medical School, he was an ordained Episcopal priest. Former students lovingly called him “Father Doctor Strobel.”

Among his most important lessons, Strobel taught to celebrate the little wins and enjoy their journeys in science.

“At the end of our busiest days in the lab, Dr. Strobel would take us to dinner at his home or some amazing restaurant where we would eat seven courses and talk for hours,” says Nash. “He always wanted to recognize our efforts and bring his students together.”

“In everything we do, we try to pass on the values that Dr. Strobel gave us and create opportunities for our students,” says Sayee Anakk. “We frequently invite our students to our home for dinner where we enjoy the same kind of seven-course meals we had with Dr. Strobel. Our office is always open, and our students know they can come to us with questions on science or life.”

As Nash and Sayee’s careers were taking off, Strobel’s health was deteriorating. The couple returned to Houston in the summer of 2019 to spend time with him and take him to his favorite restaurants. A few months later, he passed away.

Many of Strobel’s former students and trainees came together at his funeral to say farewell. As the Strobelians shared their fondest memories, an idea came to Sayee.


“I thought we should establish a scholarship to embody Strobel’s spirit in science,” says Sayee. “Everyone loved the idea, and we decided to start a crowdfunding campaign.”

With Nash and Sayee leading the effort, 28 supporters gave more than \$25,000 to establish the Henry W. Strobel, PhD, Endowed Scholarship at MD Anderson UTHealth Graduate School. The scholarship will provide financial assistance to outstanding graduate students, furthering Strobel’s legacy of recognizing and celebrating the successes of his students.

A Warning to the Wise...

I ran into this article by Nick Shay and thought it appropriate as a warning for the 2022 hurricane season.



The Atlantic hurricane season did start on June 1, and the Gulf of Mexico is already warmer than average. Even more worrying is a current of warm tropical water that is looping unusually far into the Gulf for this time of year, with the power to turn tropical storms into monster hurricanes. It’s called the Loop Current, and it’s the 800-pound gorilla of Gulf hurricane risks.

When the Loop Current reaches this far north this early in the hurricane season – especially during what’s forecast to be a busy season – it can spell disaster for folks along the Northern Gulf Coast, from Texas to Florida. This year, the Loop Current looks remarkably similar to the way it did in 2005, the year Hurricane Katrina crossed the Loop Current before devastating New Orleans. Of the 27 named storms that year, seven became major hurricanes.

Wilma and Rita also crossed the Loop Current that year and became two of the most intense Atlantic hurricanes on record.

The Loop Current was about as far north as Tampa, FL, in mid May 2022. When a tropical storm passes over the Loop Current or one of its giant eddies – large rotating pools of warm water that spin off from the current – the storm can explode in strength as it draws energy from the warm water.

Once tropical storms reach waters that are around 78 F (26 C) or warmer, they can strengthen into hurricanes, which draw most of their strength from the top 100 feet (30 meters) of the ocean. But the Loop Current’s subtropical water is deeper and warmer, and also saltier, than Gulf common water allowing the warm current and its eddies to retain heat to great depths.

In mid-May 2022, the Loop Current had water temperatures 78 F or warmer down to about 330 feet (100 meters). By summer, that heat could extend down to around 500 feet (about 150 meters). With favorable atmospheric conditions, this deep reservoir of heat helped a storm explode almost overnight into a very powerful and dangerous Category 4 hurricane.

Forecasters have other clues— one is La Niña, the climate opposite of El Niño. La Niña has been unusually strong in spring 2022, allowing more wind shear toward the end of the season. Dust from the Sahara and low humidity can both reduce the likelihood storms will form.

The keynote speaker will be Terry Fulmer, PhD, RN, President of the John Hartford Foundation dedicated to improving the care of older adults. Established in 1929, the Foundation has a current endowment of more than half a billion dollars. She serves as the chief strategist for the Foundation and her vision for better care of older adults is

catalyzing the Age-Friendly Health Systems social movement.

She received her bachelor's degree from Skidmore College, her master's and doctoral degrees from Boston College and her Geriatric Nurse Practitioner Post-Master's Certificate from NYU. She completed a Brookdale National Fellowship and she is the first nurse to have served on the board of the American Geriatrics Society. She is also the first nurse to have served as President of the Gerontological Society of America, which awarded her the 2019 Donald P. Kent Award for exemplifying the highest standards for professional leadership in the field of aging.

Dr. Fulmer is nationally and internationally recognized as a leading expert in geriatrics and is also known for conceptualization and development of the national NICHE program and research on the topic of elder abuse and neglect. She has held faculty appointments at Columbia University, and she has also held appointments at Boston College, Yale University, and the Harvard Division on Aging at Harvard Medical School. She is a Distinguished Practitioner of the National Academies of Practice and currently an attending nurse at Mount Sinai Medical Center in NYC. Her clinical appointments have included the Beth Israel Hospital in Boston, the Massachusetts General Hospital, and the NYU Langone Medical Center. She is a Fellow of the American Academy of Nursing, the Gerontological Society of America, and the New York Academy of Medicine where she served as vice-chair. She has authored over 150 peer-reviewed papers and edited 10 books.
