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The UTHRO Health Symposium...

After a two year hiatus thanks to Covid we did had a chance to revive the symposium and the members responded. Thirty two of you showed up and I personally had the great pleasure to welcome one of my old colleagues from the Med School after so many years. The city of Houston 's Health department brought a large contingent of vaccinators, nurses and overall very helpful people when the paperwork got a bit much. But anyone who wanted the vaccinations got theirs. My wife and I got both the Flu and the Covid booster so we had to wait 15 minutes before we could get up and go—Covid protocol.

My contact at the City—Omar Salgado—even came by to say hello and introduce himself a truly nice touch after some 7 years of just email contact. Kelli and her crew were just outstanding. Gill and Barry Rittmen served a wonderful luncheon of sandwiches, croissants and fruit and the audience was now ready to listen to our speakers, Drs Naik, Reveille and Lee.

Aanand Naik, MD, has been named executive director of The Consortium on Aging. The executive director's role was previously held by Naik's longtime colleague and mentor, the late Carmel Dyer, MD.

"Dr. Dyer left a lasting impression on me and on the Consortium. It is an honor to step into this role and continue her legacy," said Naik.

The Consortium on Aging is dear to our hearts and the recipient of UTHRO's Endowment and we did hear from him what his plans for the future of the Consortium are.

I didn't realize that our main speakers today were trained at Johns Hopkins in Baltimore. Dr. Reveille received his rheumatology training at Johns Hopkins in the 1980's. before being recruited by Dr. Arnett to join the faculty at the Med School in 1987. He is involved in Phase III studies of biologic therapies for ankylosing spondylitis/ spondyloarthritis. He has been named a "Super Doc" in Texas Monthly every year since 2005 and Best Doctors in America since 2008. And the audience could see why. Reveille is a very animated speaker and his topic "Lower Back Injuries" with well documented visuals and advice on treatments. And as he made me aware when I asked him to speak today to a group of UT Retirees that he himself is a septuagenarian and keenly aware of being "weak in the wheels"

Dr. Jessica Lee received her MD from the Medical Branch in Galveston. She then completed her Internal Medicine residency at the Med School at Houston and subsequently finished a two-year Geriatric Fellowship at The Johns Hopkins. Her clinical interests are in house calls, while her research interests are in frailty and nutrition. But unbeknownst to us she got us up out of our chairs to do some well needed exercise as well point us to some very helpful internet sites. *Henny van Dijk*

Hot Topics in Aging Report...

This was the sixth "Hot Topics in Aging" and this time it was held in person at the Beth Robertson Auditorium at the Brown Foundation Institute for Molecular Medicine.

I would like to start with two disclaimers—one: I could only attend the morning session due to other obligations and two: The presentations were all very technical and as someone once said well above my paygrade. But what I did gather was a feel for the direction of the research presented and the targeting of concerns of the investigators as well as the strides made in their research.

The keynote speaker Selva Baltan, MD, PhD professor of anesthesiology at Oregon Health & Science University who shared her decades of research of Aging White Matter in Ischemia and in doing so set the tenor of the morning session as the following presenters dealt with issues relating to stroke or dementia. Baltan research was done with rats and her powerpoint visuals were first rate and even for me guite clear and understandable. Her research focuses on mechanisms of white matter injury to develop ideal stroke therapeutics that are directed towards stroke protection across age, to restore function when applied after injury. One of her experimental approaches include optic nerve models, employing electrophysiological recordings, and advanced microscopy techniques. Studying on the role of protein acetylation and mitochondrial dynamics in white matter stroke expands her findings to neurodegenerative diseases such as Multiple Sclerosis and Alzheimer 's disease that involve white matter. The risk for ischemic stroke increases drastically with age. Although this has been attributed to vascular factors, aging could result in changes such that the central nervous system (CNS) itself has an increased vulnerability to stroke injury. White matter (WM) is injured in most strokes. She suggests that failure to protect WM is one of the primary reasons contributing to the lack of successful stroke therapy. The long term goal is to determine if aging WM function can be improved. Recently, we reported that CNS WM is intrinsically more vulnerable to ischemic injury in older animals.

After the keynote address three young faculty members gave short presentations vying for the Harry Bovay grant which was won by Xin Li for her presentation on treatment of age-related type 2 diabetes.

Drs. Schultz and MCCullough took us from the research lab to the bedside with 2 presentations showing actual patient cases through MRIs. Schultz one of my favorite speakers presented 4 cases trying to determine if the patients were indeed vascular dementia cases. MCCullough, Chair of Neurology and an energetic investigator in cerebral vascular disease, discussed sex differences in cell death pathways during stroke, which are now recognized as major factors, but she concentrated on breathing disfunction in the recovery process.
