We will have dinner at Mom Alone; I have not been able


to find a pricelist for their menu, but it does have all the traditional items. Of course the dinner is on your dime.

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Clara Welsh passed away in August according to her son Michael. She was just shy of 100. Clara was my colleague at the Med School in the Department of Otolaryncology and the assistant to Dr. R. Jahrsdoerfer. Today there are no people who, remember her from that time, however I did and I also knew that she was an important part of the fledgling organization called UTH-RO. She was a pioneering member of that organization and I found an image from 1995, 2 years after

Remembering Clara Welsh

Her son Michael send me this:

Clara Welsh retired in 1988. Although she enjoyed working at UT, she looked forward to retirement at age 65. In retirement she enjoyed walking, reading, socializing with friends and traveling. She went to Hawaii several times to visit two of her grandchildren, Jeremy and Matthew, sons of her older son Chris. She traveled to Michigan periodically to visit her younger son, Michael and his two children, Daniel and Catherine. On a number of occasions the grandchildren traveled to Houston to visit Clara. Clara enjoyed the social interactions and concerts she would go to with friends from the Presbyterian Church. Clara loved cats and worked with others to get the feral cats in the neighborhood neutered. She also took many of the cats into her home over the years, seducing them with food and comfort. In 2003, Clara traveled to Michigan to celebrate her 80th birthday. In 2013, her sons and grandchildren met in Houston to celebrate her 90th birthday. In 2017 Clara moved to Savannah, with two cats, to be close to Michael. She was active and involved with friends until the last few months of her life. She died August 11, 2023, less than 3

months short of her one hundredth birthday. Her remains are at rest along the banks of the Wilmington River among azaleas and large magnolia trees in Greenwich Cemetery in Savannah.

Some Updates ...



The Court Martial Hearing in 1917

In January 2019 speakers Louis Aulbach and Linda Gorski gave us a glimpse of that time as one of the most interesting chapters in Houston's history in what is now Memorial Park along the banks of Buffalo Bayou. For it was here that the U.S. Army's sprawling Camp Logan was built in the middle of the First World War to train soldiers for combat. But... on August 23 1917 156 soldiers from the allblack 24th infantry rioted also known as the Camp Logan Mutiny. The incident occurred within a climate of overt hostility from members of the all-white HPD against members of the local black community and black soldiers stationed at Camp Logan. Many of the black soldiers mutinied and marched to Houston, where they opened fire and killed eleven civilians and five policemen. In accordance with policies of the time, the soldiers were tried at a court martial-thirteen were executed, and 41 were sentenced to life imprisonment.

Updated: Nov. 12, 2023 10:47 a.m. More than a century has passed since 110 Black soldiers stationed at Camp Logan were convicted of mutiny, murder and assault in the 1917 Houston Riot, with 19 of them executed at Fort Sam Houston. Now those convictions have been overturned.

Proposition 9 ...

On November 7 Voters approved to pass Proposition 9 (Prop 9) in the 2023 Election with 2,141,913 (83.73%) votes to approve and 416,191 (16.27%) votes to reject. The amendment of Prop 9 to the Texas Constitution would create \$3.45 billion to the Teacher Retirement System of Texas (TRS) to provide a cost-of-living-adjustment to eligible annuitants within TRS. Prop 9 will provide a pay increase, a COLA (cost of living adjustment) of up to 6% for nearly half a million annuitants in the Teacher Retirement System (TRS). It will not only benefit teachers but other school staff members such as bus drivers, custodians and cafeteria workers. Retired teachers in Texas have not received a cost-of-living adjustment since 2013, which only teachers who retired by 2004 were eligible for.

Those who retired before Aug. 31, 2001, would receive a 6% increase, while those who retired between Aug. 31, 2001 and Aug. 31, 2013 would receive a 4% increase. Teachers and employees who retired between Aug. 31, 2013 and Aug. 31, 2020 would receive a 2% increase. Another TSHL victory, thanks Viola et al.

A Local Christmas Story...

` The two children wearing shabby clothes and long faces gazed at the lavish Christmas display in a downtown Houston store window.

They shook their heads when a kindly stranger asked them a question. "No, Santa Claus never comes to our house," said the girl, shivering in the cold.

Her little brother chimed in, "I wish he would come this time and bring Sister that doll in there - and bring me something, too."



The year was 1911, and the young brother and sister vanished into the December night. They would never know they were the inspiration for a toy drive that has helped millions of needy children and continues with gusto 100 years later.

The man who saw the children staring longingly at the gifts was the Chronicle city editor George Kepple. He was so moved by their plight that the next year, 1912, he unveiled what would become his pride and joy - the toy program Goodfellows.

Over the years the true story of the children in front of the store window, based on a speech Kepple made in 1936, has become a legend. The tale that began to evolve in the 1950s had Kepple helping a poor shoeshine boy outside the Chronicle building on Christmas Eve.

If the facts blurred over time, the truth is that charitable Houstonians have helped Goodfellows grow despite two world wars, the Great Depression and multiple recessions. The Chronicle pays the program's administrative costs and uses readers' donations to buy toys. In the past 20 years alone, readers have donated almost \$12.8 million, buying more than 4 million toys for nearly 2 million children. In honor of the centennial, some readers have been moved to explain what the program means to them.

"We knew our first Christmas together was going to be bleak, especially for our 1-year-old baby girl," Ms.Martinez said. She and her little family had just moved into their first apartment, but didn't have enough money to pay the bills and buy gifts. Then Martinez read about Goodfellows in the paper.

"On Christmas morning, not only was my baby girl surprised but my husband was as well. I hadn't told him that I had written in because I was afraid he would have gotten angry due to his pride. But the look on his face, seeing his girlie opening all those gifts, was priceless.

In the Chronicle story that launched the first Goodfellows campaign, Kepple wrote: "The Christmas season is at hand. Let us link our hands in warm friendship. Let us seek out the less blessed. Let us be brothers of brothers. Let us be Goodfellows."
