John Ribble, MD—Remembered



On Sep.21 I got word from the Office of Communications that John Ribble passed away. The news came too late for me to contact those who knew the longest serving Dean in the Medical School's history who at one time not only was Dean but also President of the Health Science Center.

I dedicate this column celebrating his life by those who knew him, had worked with him and admired what he meant to the school.

"I was John Ribble's Senior Executive Assistant from 1985 to 1992. Following him from his position as Associate Dean of Academic Affairs to Dean and Interim President. He was the peanut butter to everybody's PBJ sandwich, and getting people to work together for the betterment of the Medical School, fostering relationships with the Faculty and other Texas Medical Center Institutions. And on the other side of the world with the Institute of Chinese Medicine in Beijing.

Dr Ribble treated people with respect, fairness and patience. He also took the time to mentor medical students. One of his friends would tease him, calling him a college dropout, when actually after his third year at Rice University he was accepted into Medical School. Rice University held a special place in his heart and he would often escape to walk around the campus. A proud alum, he also liked to utilize their facilities for faculty events and showcase their student musicians. John C. Ribble made a difference and it was an honor to be able to work with him." "Dr. John Ribble served a key leadership role as the longest acting dean of our medical school. His leadership was critical for a new medical school to develop from its early days into a mature institution of the first order. I was fortunate to work with him in numerous capacities in which I observed his leadership style first hand that epitomized "servant leadership".

Servant leadership is based on a philosophy that the most effective leaders see their role as serving others In a university the "others" include students, trainees, faculty, staff, and other administrative leaders. In the simplest sense servant leaders see their number one priority as serving others to help them function more effectively and efficiently in their roles, develop personally and professionally, and enhance their future career opportunities They do this in many ways including mentorship, teaching others by their words and actions, and serving as personal examples by their integrity, empathy, and compassion. Dr. Ribble exhibited these qualities and actions in his institutional leadership roles and personal behavior and whose leadership philosophy guided the development of the medical school and its subsequent leaders. This is one of his enduring and important legacies that positively impacted the school and all those within it." George Stancel

Our Endowment Drive ...



The UTHRO Endowment for Healthy Aging is alive and well! But, we want to keep it healthy. For our newer members, and as a refresher for our long-time members, a little history of the origins of the UTHRO Endowment for Healthy Aging may be in order. From its inception in 1993 until about 2000, UTHRO functioned primarily as a means for social interaction among retirees, a way to stay connected, to par-

ticipate in fun and educational activities, and a means to stay in touch with activities of UTHealth.

Around 1999, the organization decided to present an annual Excellence Award and conducted fund raising every year, giving the money to the UTHealth Consortium on Aging Brain Health Clinic to help fund some of their projects in geriatrics.

In 2016, the Executive Committee presented a proposal to the membership to establish the UTHRO Endowment for Healthy Aging, administered through UTHealth, instead of giving the Excellence Award each year. This was approved by the membership. It was felt that by establishing an endowment, monies could be accumulated and earn interest to be used to support patient care, education and clinical research related to aging.

It started with a group of Founders, both UTHRO members and friends, who contributed the \$25,000 required to initiate the Endowment. Through annual fundraising, it has grown to about \$110,000 today. We hope that the fund will continue to grow and generate more interest so that we can make significant contributions in support of our motto of "Seniors Helping Seniors".

This is an opportunity to build a legacy for our organization, to leave something of value to UTHealth, to contribute to the exciting research in geriatrics from young investigators. It is the hope that you, the UTHRO members, think that this is an important project and will continue to support it and help it grow.
